y sister and I have been together most all of our lives, we are all we have!

We have never had the love, kindness, or a gentle touch that most others get—at least when they are puppies.

The day we were purchased we came home to live outside. Rain, snow, sleet, or shine we lived outside. Our dog house consists of a metal shed; our food is the cheapest Mom can buy.

People drive by and see us and we see the tears in their eyes, but no one helps us, no one cares.

One winter day some men showed up and took us away, they said we were emaciated, they said we were dehydrated. We were terrified. "Who were these people? Why were they doing this to us?" We did not understand.

We spent our first Christmas inside a won-

derful vet's office receiving love, kindness, and touching—that gentle touch we had never before felt. We were warm and fed lots of good food. Slowly we started to trust and we wanted to love these nice people. But then our world came falling in!

Early one morning they came to take us to the lobby and who was there but our Mom! I begged them, "Please don't let her take us! Please God save us once again!" My pleas went unanswered. As Mom dragged us away I looked back to see the tears running down the faces of our new friends.

They said Mom was related to people in high places, they said Mom promised to take proper care of us, they said Mom promised a lot of things.

Well it is now New Year's Day we are cold, thirsty, and hungry. We are outside in our metal shed and again all we have is each other. There is no happy ending for us.

GOING OUT OF TOWN? Dane Home Alone?

"College students as dog sitters rock!"

olutions for caring for your dog while you are away can be difficult to find. Below are some options, and concerns to be aware of beyond checking references.

College students provide in-home care

If you live near a college town, a under-utilized resource can be found there: college students. Pet-loving students can be found who will jump at the chance to leave the dorm and stay at your house with your fur kids. Of course proper screening of these potential sitters is a must, but many have enjoyed great success. And the ability to go off to a week-long work conference practically guilt free is a godsend.

HHGDR adopter Tom Mattingly said "I returned to dogs that, while they were happy we were home, wondered where their new friend had gone. The students are happy to have a great way to make extra money, and both the dogs and the house are watched while we're gone. College students as dog sitters rock!"

Professional pet sitters make rounds

There are very good professional pet sitters

out there who will stop by your home and care for your dog. However, many Danes do not like to be left alone for hours—such as at night when life-threatening conditions such as bloat are more likely to occur.

Fellow Dane lovers take dogs "in"

Another option is a knowledgeable friend or colleague who welcome your dog into their home while you are away. Christe McGarry, a fellow HHGDR adopter, is one of these.

Boarding Kennels and Vets

There are many fine boarding kennels but it is very rare that a kennel or vet office is staffed overnight. As Danes are susceptible to bloat (especially when stressed), and bloat most often occurs during the night, this is a real cause for concern. Kennels where the owners live on the grounds seem to be more likely to at least have rounds in the evening, but be sure to find out expressly when the kennel is staffed.

eing the "parents" of three older Danes has been one of the most rewarding and fulfilling acts of our lives. Shadow found us when she was a year and a half, so we have an understanding of what is like to have a young dog. We enjoyed her energy and enthusiasm. When we had the opportunity to bring in another family member into our home, Doc joined us, also a rescue, at the age of four. He was past the puppy stage but still very active. Again, he was a joy to us and showed us how wonderful the male Danes could be.

ity to trust, and desire to show affection. They are full of strength, determination, and passion. It is as though they realize how far they come and, in fact, how far they've helped Ben and me to grow.

Yes, there are times when it is challenging for all of us. Older dogs begin to experience aliments that come from longer, perhaps hard, lives. They move slower than before, and their coats turn gray. It is really no different than what one experiences with older parents in some ways by making adjustments as needed and staying attuned to their needs to make life comfortable and pleasurable. We've fought several health issues including Doc's cancer, but have been extremely fortunate. We attribute this to fact that we keep the dogs in an

active lifestyle with walks and fresh air; healthy treats and always in moderation to keep the calories down; consistency with maintenance and preventative vet visits; and human-grade dog food.

Our latest family addition has been one of the best of all; Brandy came from the pound at the age of 11. She is full of life and rules the roost. She is brilliant, stubborn, loud, and knows how to melt one's heart. Extremely affectionate, she loves to be cuddled and holds her plastic toy like Linus' blanket. Her brindle coat is nearly completely gray and her back sags similar to an aged horse in pasture. Now 13, she is still amazing and beautiful.

When the five of us take walks or pile on the sectional couch together, life feels complete. It reminds me of when family gathers around the Thanksgiving table—everyone coming home to a comfort-
