Too Strict? A True Story from a Rescue Volunteer

So you think the Rescue is too strict on its policies for fencing and not allowing your dog off leash? Read on...

SHADE was a Goldendoodle who was used for breeding purposes on a farm. He was crated pretty much all the time but not technically "abused." He certainly did not have the human companionship that he needed. The owners decided that he was no longer needed for breeding and decided to search for a new home for him.

Anne and Jim had lost their dog about a year ago. Anne's job was stressing her out and she convinced Jim that a dog would help her stress level. He agreed. A friend of Anne's knew of a Goldendoodle that needed a good home. Introductions were made, and Shade came home with Anne and Jim.

He was the perfect dog for Anne and was exactly what she needed. SHADE became very attached to Anne and was "her" dog. He went everywhere with Anne and wouldn't let her out of his sight. He minded, he never strayed, and just wanted to be with Anne.

Anne and Jim did not have a fence, except for the side of my fence separating our properties. Shade was always good about not running away and always came when Anne called him back. Lots of wildlife live behind our houses—deer, raccoons, groundhogs, stray cats—everything that should tempt a dog to give chase. Not Shade. He even went in the front yard with Anne when she was gardening or loading her car for work. Never needed to be leashed. He was always by her side, and she always thought he would never stray from her...

...Until tonight. Anne was in the front of her house loading her car for work. SHADE, as always, was with her. Suddenly SHADE ran towards the street, chasing two neighborhood cats.

Anne called and called, but he did not come to her. A car was coming down the street at the same time. Shade was killed instantly. Now Anne is agonizing over the loss of her beloved Shade and wondering what she could have done differently.

Do you still think the Rescue is too strict? I didn't think so.

About the Rescue

HHGDR has operated as a volunteer-run Rescue since 1992. It became a registered 501(c)3 nonprofit in 1998, and to date has placed 1,589 dogs and horses in carefully screened forever homes. HHGDR serves Ohio, extreme northern Ken-

tucky, and parts of eastern Indiana. Currently 14 dogs/horses are available for adoption. In addition, the Rescue houses Sanctuary Dogs living out their lives in the safe environment of the Rescue (the latter unadoptable for health,

age, or other conditions). In 2017, HHGDR spent more than \$20,700 on vet bills alone. Contributions are always welcome and are tax-deductible.

She was born December 11, 1929, daughter of the late Vernon and Mildred (Arrasmith) Marconett.

She was a 1947 graduate of Wilmington High School and 1951 of Ohio Northern University.

Nancy was an active member and Elder Emeritus of First Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), and was a retired pharmacist working at Clinton Memorial Hospital and Mercy Health in Springfield.

Surviving are her church family, friends in the community and Great Dane Rescue.

A Dog's Safe Space—The Rescue Dogs Speak Out

Does your dog have a safe place? What is a safe place you may ask, and why does a dog need one?

Some of the dogs here at the Rescue were saying they wish they had had a safe place to go to. As a human, when you are tired of your children, husband or wife "bugging" you, you can get up and walk into another room, close the door, and de-stress.

Unfortunately, we dogs do not have the option to close the door behind us, so instead we need you as the human to give us a place we can get away! It doesn't have to be fancy, it can be as simple as our dog bed, our crate, or better still, both.

This is really important when you have children in the home! The big job comes in teaching yourself, and especially your children, NOT to bother us when we are in our safe place!! We cannot say, "Go away, you are annoying me or you are hurting me." All we can do is growl or get up and move!

Sadly, so many times when we give warning signs, you or your children do not listen and the result is we bite or snap and you say it is all our fault. NO IT ISN'T! If we are trying to tell you get out of our face and leave us alone, LISTEN! Walk away and leave the dog alone!

Do not let your children lay on our bed when we are resting. If I want to snuggle with the child I will seek the child out and lay with them! I am also NOT the child's pillow. We see on TV that they make pillows just for humans to rest their heads on so make sure your child uses them instead of me! Trust me it will not be cute when the child or you are bitten and are en route to the emergency room.

Please, for Dog sake, remember to give us dogs a safe place! Remember to listen and PAY ATTENTION when we tell you to "...get out of my face and leave me alone!"

Until we learn to talk human, YOU, the human, need to be our guardian and supervise your children, and give us a safe place. Be a good role model and teach your children to respect us when we are in our safe place. And that respect extends to not only your children but visiting children and friends. They all need to stay out of our safe place! Humans expect us to respect our families but we need to be respected, too.


Mozart's Mission @ HHGDR
