Have you ever responded to the question, "Why do you love dogs so much?" with a shrug and, "I don't know, maybe it's in my genes." It seems you may be right! Researchers studied the genetic makeup of more than 35,000 twin pairs both identical and non-identical. They found that genes had a significant influence on their attraction to dogs.

To quote the study: "The researchers found concordance rates of dog ownership to be much larger in identical twins than in non-identical ones supporting the view that genetics indeed plays a major role in the choice of owning a dog."

The study, published in *Scientific Reports* and led by Tove Fall, a professor of molecular epidemiology at the Department of Medical Sciences and the Science for Life Laboratory at Uppsala University, stated: "We were surprised to see that a person's genetic make-up appears to be a significant influence in whether they own a dog. As such, these findings have major implications in several different fields related to understanding dog-human interaction throughout history and in modern times."

MICHIGAN STATE UNIVERSITY ANIMAL LEGAL & CENTER

Michigan State University College of Law's *Animal Legal & Historical Center* offers the resource "Table of State Laws that Protect Animals Left in Parked Vehicles," compiled by Rebecca F. Wisch. [LINK]

According to it, "Approximately 31 states have laws that deal with animals left in unattended vehicles. Most of these laws provide that the animal must be confined or unattended in a parked or stationary vehicle."

And Ohio is among them!

Ohio Revised Code § 959.133

Immunity for damage resulting from forcible entry of motor vehicle for purpose of removing animal

(A) Except as provided in division (C) of this section, a person shall be immune from civil liability for any damage resulting from the forcible entry of a motor vehicle for the purpose of removing an animal from the vehicle if the person does all of the following:

(1) Determines the vehicle is locked or there is otherwise no reasonable method for the animal to exit the vehicle.

(2) Has a good faith belief that forcible entry into the vehicle is necessary because the animal is in imminent danger of suffering harm if not immediately removed from the vehicle and, based upon the circumstances known to the person at the time, the belief is a reasonable one. (3) Has made a good faith effort to contact the local law enforcement agency, the fire department, or a 9-1-1 operator prior to forcibly entering the vehicle. If contact is not possible prior to forcibly entering the vehicle, the person shall make contact as soon as possible after forcibly entering the vehicle.

(4) Makes a good faith effort to place a notice on the vehicle's windshield with the person's contact information, the reason the entry was made, the location of the animal, and the fact that the authorities have been notified.

(5) Remains with the animal in a safe location until law enforcement or emergency responders arrive.

(6) Used not more force to enter the vehicle and remove the animal from the vehicle than was necessary under the circumstances.

(B) Nothing in this section shall affect the person's civil liability if the person attempts to render aid to the animal in addition to what is authorized by this section.

(C) A person shall not be immune from civil liability for any damage resulting from the forcible entry of a motor vehicle for the purpose of removing an animal from the vehicle if the person's actions constitute recklessness or willful or wanton misconduct with regard to the forcible entry of the motor vehicle.

(D) As used in this section, "harm" means injury or death.

HHGDR has operated as a volunteer-run Rescue since 1992. It became a registered 501(c)3 nonprofit in 1998, and to date has placed 1,580 dogs and horses in carefully screened forever homes. HHGDR serves Ohio, extreme north-

ern Kentucky, and parts of eastern Indiana. Currently 16 dogs and 2 horses are available for adoption. In addition, the Rescue houses Sanctuary Dogs living out their lives in the safe environment of the Rescue (the latter unadoptable for health, age, or other conditions). In 2017, HHGDR spent more than \$20,700 on vet bills alone. Contributions are always welcome and are tax-deductible.

Tips for Keeping Your Pet Safe This Summer by Judy Yacks

Picnics, beaches, hiking... all fun activities that we look forward to in the summer. By taking precautions, your special "furiends" can enjoy the summer right along with you.

- Dogs get much thirstier in the heat than we do, so make sure they have access to plenty of water and shade. And don't forget to take along a bottle of water for your pet when you grab yours on your way outside.
- Signs of dehydration include dry gums and excessive drooling. While we sweat, dogs pant and drink water to bring down their body temperature. Signs of overheating and heat stroke: include heavy panting, dry or bright red gums, thick drool, vomiting, diarrhea, and wobbly legs.
- If your pet is overheated, move them to a cooler space and immediately begin to gradually lower their body temperature by applying COOL water all over their body or soak in a COOL bath. Just as you would treat a human, place wet towels over the back of the neck, armpits, and groin area. Heat stroke can be a life or death situation. Cooling shirts are available if your dog is prone to overheating.
- Not all pets can swim. Do not leave your pets unsupervised around a pool. Never try and force your pet into the water.
- Fleas, ticks, spiders, mosquitos, snakes...pests for sure and they all create their own set of issues. Observe your pet after a bee sting for an allergic reaction. Never use insect repellent meant for people on your pets. Dogs and cats are very sensitive to DEET. And don't forget heartworm preventative!
- Food and drinks at picnics and cookouts can be poisonous to pets. Avoid foods with raisins, grapes, onions, chocolate, products made with sweetener xylitol, alcoholic beverages,

corn on the cob, and any food with bones, which could pose a choking hazard.

- The heat on a sidewalk from the blazing sun can blister your dogs' feet. Walk them early in the day or in the evening when temperatures are a little cooler.
- Never leave your pet alone in a car. A car can heat to over 100 degrees in less than 10 minutes putting your pet in grave danger. And if common sense is not enough, it is illegal in at least 16 states.

Summer should be a time of bonding fun and memory building with your pet. Heeding these tips will help keep her safe!

MOZART began painting with his paws, making cards, decorative tiles and paw stamped clothing. He loved his cheese treats while creating and his art continued to mature.



Harlequin Haven FAQs

Q. Who decides what dog is right for me?

A. The directors and other knowledgeable volunteers who know the dogs and can match your lifestyle and family for several potential matches. Please read our <u>adoption</u> procedures.

Q. Why can't I adopt a dog as gift for my girlfriend (father, fiancé, grandmother, etc.)?

A. It is extremely important to match the individual dog with the individual person, so we must have the adopter themselves apply, interview with us, and meet the dogs. If you really want to make a "gift," buy the adopter some pet accessories or offer to pay the adoption fee. See "Dogs and Puppies as <u>Gifts"</u>

Q. I live in a rough neighborhood—are Danes good guard dogs?

No. If you want protection, get an alarm system. If you want to love and be loved in return, get a dog. Danes will typically help a thief carry your items out, as long as that person is nice to the dog.
